## 2026 Board of Director Elections

Board of Director election is held at the Annual Meeting on Wednesday, January 21 from 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM at the Tippecanoe Township Fire Station #1, 112 North Street in Battle Ground. Please bring photo ID. If you are not listed as owner in the Tippecanoe County online property database you may provide deed documents as evidence of ownership. A freeholder may pick up their own absentee ballot on Monday and Tuesday January 19-20 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Town Hall, 100 College Street in Battle Ground.

### Candidates who were nominated by December 12, 2026:

Historic Battle Ground and River Bluff  
Area south of CR600 North

Adam Fridlin and incumbent Ron Holladay  
David Bisher, incumbent

Battle Ground Conservancy District follows Indiana law concerning voting in conservancy district elections. Each “freeholder” is entitled to one (1) vote.

Using the freehold determinants contained in Indiana Code § 14-33-2-3, the following applies for purposes of determining who may cast a vote:

- One (1) or more tracts of land owned solely by only one (1) freeholder constitute one (1) freehold.
- One (1) or more tracts of land owned in joint title by at least two (2) identical freeholders constitute one (1) freehold. However, if one (1) of the freeholders owning the freehold in joint title is a different or additional person, each freehold in joint title among non-identical persons constitutes a separate and additional freehold.
- Only one (1) freeholder's signature may be counted for any one (1) freehold. If a freehold is held in joint title, only one (1) freeholder's signature may be counted and it may be the signature of any one (1) of the freeholders owning the freehold in joint title. If a given freeholder qualifies as set forth in this section for at least two (2) freeholds, the freeholder's signature shall be counted for each freehold.

### Examples:

- A husband and wife jointly own one (1) freehold. They are entitled to one (1) vote.
- An individual owns two (2) freeholds. That individual is entitled to one (1) vote.
- A husband and wife jointly own two (2) freeholds in the same or substantially the same name (e.g., both freeholds owned as, “X and Y, husband and wife”). They are entitled to one (1) vote.
- A husband and wife own two (2) freeholds, but in different names (e.g., husband owns one freehold and wife owns different freehold; however one of the properties must be solely owned). The husband and wife are entitled to one (1) vote each (the husband for the freehold he owns, and the wife for the freehold she owns)
